Christmas the Event

Christmas has a long and varied history. It was been celebrated for centuries by different people, at different times, in different places and in different ways.

In the middle ages, Christmas celebrations were rowdy and raucous. From 1659 to 1681, the celebration of Christmas was outlawed in Boston, and law breakers were fined five shillings.

Today, in the Greek and Russian Orthodox Churches, Christmas is celebrated 13 days after December 25th, which is also referred to as Epiphany or Three Kings Day. This is the day it is believed that the Wise men finally found Jesus in the Manger.

Christmas speaks of the word becoming flesh in a real way. It speaks of promise becoming reality. The prophets prophesied of the coming Messiah, who would be the Saviour of the world. The Messiah who would come on a rescue mission. The prophet Isaiah in a bold and daring statement declared:

"For unto us a child is born, unto numberless, differing in g us a Son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Won-Continued

derful, Counsellor, The Mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace'' Isaiah 9:6. This prophetic word was announced by the prophet centuries before the birth of Christ.

It is John who puts it best:

"And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father) full of grace and truth." John 1:14. This speaks of the birth of the promised Messiah, whose coming signals the advent of a rescue mission, to save the world.

Christmas therefore is a celebration of God taking decisive action to restore a broken world. It is not so much a time to celebrate a day, as it is to celebrate the greatest event that has ever taken place in the history of humankind. It is a time when peace came not in word only, but is experienced in the hearts and lives of men and women.

The Moravian Star which is erected on Advent Sunday has a three-fold meaning. It testifies to the greatness of the Creator who made the stars on the fourth day, numberless, differing in glory and praising the might that laid the foundations of the world.

It points to the Divine Star, foretold by the prophet who said. "A Star shall come out of Jacob" (Numbers 24: 17), and fulfilled in Him who said of Himself, 'I am the root and descendant of David, the bright and morning star". (Reve.22:16) As a church, we ought to celebrate the Christ Child. One song writer in announcing the birth, declared:

Hail the Sun of Righteousness! Light and life to all He brings, Risen with healing in His wings. Mild He lays His glory by, Born that man no more may die, Born to raise the sons of earth, Born to give them second birth. Hark, the herald angels sing, "Glory to the new-born King!"

ADDRESSING THE NEEDS OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES AF-FECTED BY POVERTY AND AIDS IN TANZANIA

Many children in Tanzania "have suffered the loss of one or both parents, and have to cope with grief and personal loss. Many are also vulnerable to malnutrition, infections, lack of education, economic exploitation, and physical and sexual abuse. Many more millions of children worldwide are vulnerable because of wars, poverty, political oppression, and family and community breakdown."

Likewise AIDS Ministries received a request for assistance in developing a community faith based program to address the needs of children at risk in the Lake Victoria District of the Moravian Church in Tanzania Kim Barthlomew and (MCT). Esther Tesh visited programs and organizations that minister to children and families in need, in the Western, Southern, and Southwestern Provinces of the MCT. Most programs were sponsored by or affiliated with the Moravian Church. All programs provided services to Orphans and vulnerable Children (OVC) without regard to religious affiliation. Most programs defined orphans as a child who had lost one or both parents.

Moravian Church in Tanzania, Western Province (MCT-WP

In the Lake Victoria District (LVD), church officials and Women's Fellowship leaders de-

scribed a strong church involvement in outreach to help meet needs of OVC and their families. We visited several families in the Kigoto and Magu Parishes that were recipients of church outreach.

In Mwanza City, the urban Kigoto Parish community outreach program food and subsistence supplies are provided to OVC. With women from Kigoto, we climbed a steep rocky path up a hill to the home of a grandmother who cared for an eightyear-old girl, orphaned four years ago when her mother died of AIDS. Recently this child's seven -year-old sibling also died of AIDS. Next we visited an eightyear-old girl whose mother had died. She lived in a small apartment which opened onto a crowded courtyard surrounded by 8-10 apartments. The child was home alone that evening. Her caregiver, an aunt, was at the market to sell food to earn money. Lastly we saw an HIV positive mother who lived in a one room apartment with five children, ages 6—17 years. This mother lost her husband to AIDS six years ago. The women of Kigoto who visited with us were quite familiar with the families visited. The funds necessary to help these families had come from their fundraising efforts. They had raised the funds necessary to have resources for helping these and other families.

A Compassion International preschool program in the Kigoto Parish also serves orphaned children. This program provides medical care, uniforms, school supplies, and tuition for children from preschool through university.

In the rural Magu Parish, community outreach by the church was evident. We visited a widow who cares for five grandchildren orphaned after their mother died, most likely of AIDS. Next we saw a woman who cares for two young children. She had much difficulty walking because of having had polio. At Gininiga village, a congregation in Magu Parish, we visited a widow with nine children. including a girl with mental health problems. Then we stopped to visit a man with bilateral below the knee amputations from an accident at age 14. He and his wife cared for his sister's two orphaned children, one of whom looked especially thin and malnourished. This family lived in such a tiny home that we originally mistook it for a small storage shed. Just as at Kigoto, the women of Magu Parish had raised the funds necessary to help such families. In Sikonge District and Tabora Urban District the Adopt a Village Program serves a large number of children by providing food, medical care, uniforms, school supplies, and secondary school tuition. This program was described in the November 2008 issue of The Moravian. In the Tabora District *Compassion* International also operates five or six preschool programs, two of which are sponsored out of Moravian Churches. Compassion plans to extend their program into Sikonge and will provide for medical and educational needs during an orphaned child's school years as well as addressing their Psychosocial/spiritual needs.
