Leaders must assess and reassess situations constantly to see how effective the plans and programs are and how they can be improved. However, as leaders, we sometimes expect so



much, but inspect so little. At the center of every team, organization or Church is a common purpose, a mission that rises above and beyond each of the individual team members. It is therefore incumbent upon each Staff member and the entire membership to assess time and again the Mission and Vision statements of our Church, so that we understand what is meant by, we get what we inspect, not what we expect. The Vision Statement is: A Church Transformed. United. Victorious in Christ. The Vision Statement speaks of where the Church hopes to get. It is its desire. On the other hand, the Mission Statement speaks of how the Church intends to get to the Vision. In other words, it is the road map to get to the Vision of the Church. The Mission statement declares: **By the grace of** God, we seek to be faithful to our Lord Jesus Christ: without distinction, we use all that we possess to call peoples to the truth of the gospel through worship, evangelism, discipleship and service.

Our Worship, Evangelism, Discipleship and Service must challenge us every day to move to another level with the King of Kings.

Dr. Paget Henry, Sociology Professor at Brown University, one of the 8 Ivy League Universities in the North Eastern United States, addressed the students for approximately 35 minutes, after which he fielded questions from them. He spoke on personal development, professional development, discipline, University life and what it takes to be successful in life.

New Herrnhut Celebrates Freedom, Independence in Patriotic Service by Sis. Joycelyn Hewlett

Six choirs, not including the combined choirs of the Senior Choir and Men's Chorale, and three pianists would have been more than enough for most church services. But at New Herrnhut Moravian Church's Emancipation and Independence Day Service held July 3 on St. Thomas, it also required a conch shell, guitar and guiro to complete the musical ensembles.

Bro. Peter Francis played the guiro, which is a percussion instrument made of a hollow gourd with a serrated surface,

played by scraping with a stick or rod. Bro. Carl Birch played the conch shell as part of a presentation by

slave rebellion on St. Croix, which led to the Proclamation of Emancipation on July 3, 1848 by Governor-General Peter Carl Frederik von Scholten, who declared: "All unfree in the Danish West In-



dies are from this day forth free."

Bro. LeRoy Trotman, the second presenter, said it was only fitting that New Herrnhut hosted a program commemorating Emancipation Day because of the role the Moravian

Moravian missionaries played. Moravian missionaries arrived on St. Thomas in 1732. and established N e W Herrnhut, the



oldest Moravian church in the Western Hemisphere in 1737.

Retired Moravian pastor Ralph Prince led the service, which began with the National Anthem and Virgin Islands March performed by the New Herrnhut Men's Chorale, accompanied by pianist Monet Davis. The Men's Chorale also performed On the Lord's Side, composed by Bro. Davis, and a Negro spiritual, Nobody Knows the Trouble I've Seen, featuring soloist Bro. Howard Francis. Bro. Davis said that while on travel to St. Croix with the Men's Chorale, he was inspired to compose On

the Lord's Side based on the question the revolting slaves asked when they encountered anyone in path: their Whose side are you on?



The Litany for National Occasions, which included prayers for all those who are in authority, was followed by a series of patriotic songs, including: God Bless the USA, My Country Tis of Thee, God Bless America and God Bless Our Native Land. The Men's Chorale and Senior Choir, accompanied by Rebecca Faulkner on organ and JoSandra Jones James on piano, concluded the service with an amazing and inspirational rendition of the Battle Hymn of the Republic.

The other performing choirs included the Little Folks Chorale, Gospel Choir and Women's Chorus. One guest choir, the American Legion Post 90 Choir, also per-

formed. After the service, S ister Prince hosted a delicious reception in the fellowship hall.

Progress Report of Grenada Mission. by Sis Hyacinth Taylor

Greetings Brethren!

The year 2013 began with the mission work experiencing an avalanche of visitors from near and far, which is

really a fulfillment of the prophetic word which was spoken on Old Years' night, declaring this year as the year of visitation, and truly it has seen the mi-



raculous hand of God in so many ways as a result of His presence.

In April 2012, one of our members at the mission at Mt. Tranquil, after her eyes of understanding were opened, decided to return to her parents' home at Mt. Parnassus, St. George's. As a means of following up with our member, we decided to visit her for encouragement at Mt. Parnassus. As everything else, we weren't well received, even though she was aware of our visit, but that was only a distraction by the enemy, so we weren't deterred because we know when Jesus says yes, nobody can say no. The rest is history, she was baptized some months after, and to date she is one of the worship leaders at the mission and the delegate to the Provincial Youth Leaders' Conference. She is no other than Sister Samara Sylvester.

During that first visit to that new area, I felt led in my spirit to host a VBS there, based on what we encountered on the streets. This was held in August 2012, for one week. Vacation Bible School will be hosted there once again from the 29th July- 9thAugust, as we promised last year. God miraculously provided three ceiling fans, a podium, curtains, 20 song books and 22 chairs. Special thanks are being extended to Mrs. Margaret Wright Stephenson of the Spring Garden's Moravian Church, Tobago and the Health and Men's ministry of the Faith Moravian church for their assistance in the work there. Bible study continues every Tuesday and Thursday at present, worship services will commence fully at the Lord's directions.

The mission has not been one without its challenges and missteps. However, I've realized the only way you won't stumble is if you're standing still, and you'll hardly bounce your feet going backward, because it's familiar ground, therefore when it's new territory, you're more likely to bounce your feet, but God's word continues to be a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path.
