

THE CHURCH'S RESPONSE TO THE ISSUE OF ABORTION

Abortion is the termination of a pregnancy by removing or expelling the fetus or embryo from the uterus before it can survive outside the womb. The Book of Order of the Moravian Church Eastern West Indies, paragraph 13.1, says, "1. The Moravian Church, E.W.I. Province, affirms that life is God's first gift to humankind and his most precious gift through Jesus Christ. This is a fundamental tenet of our faith.

2. The Moravian Church, E.W.I., Province, further affirms the Church's redemptive ministry for all individuals faced with the difficult decision of abortion.



3. The pastors of the Moravian Church, E.W.I. Province, are requested to give careful and nurturing counsel to all individuals seeking direction on the question of abortion.

The Moravian Church's response to the issue of abortion in countries like Antigua and Barbuda, St. Kitts and Nevis, Trinidad and Tobago, Barbados, Trinidad and Tobago and the Virgin Islands points to the redemptive love of God in Christ. Along with most Christian denominations, there are some general trends in the stance of churches on abortion:

- **1.Pro-Life Stance:** Many churches, particularly the Roman Catholic Church, hold a pro-life stance on abortion. They typically view abortion as the taking of a human life and as morally wrong. They often advocate for the protection of the unborn child's right to life from the moment of conception.


A WORD ON THE CURRENT INTENSE RECORD BREAKING WEATHER

60 YEARS OF THE SANCTUARY OF GRACEHILL MORAVIAN

Information for this article was gleaned from the 240th anniversary magazine, Bishop Conrad Spencer, and other conversations.

Gracehill Moravian Church, Liberta, Antigua is 251 years old. Whereas the current location is the one known to most, the work did not begin there. The work and witness of the Moravian Church in Liberta began in 1773 at Bailey Hill, three miles south of the current location. However, insanitary conditions there forced the ministry to relocate in 1781 to an area on a hill in Liberta formerly owned by a woman named Grace. The area became known as Gracehill. In 1964, ground broke on January 5, to erect the new green, limestone sanctuary.

In 1960 the present site on which Gracehill now stands was acquired from Mr. Clement Gordon. During this time the sanctuary at Old Gracehill was in significant disrepair. The new pastor, Rev. William Gramley, recognised the need for a new sanctuary and began putting plans together. On January 5, 1964, there was a march from Old Gracehill to this location for the groundbreaking ceremony of this sanctuary and the Christian Education Centre.

Not all the members were in favour of the move. There was a vote to determine the next steps. The voices of the younger members drowned out the voices of the older members which gave the nod for new work to begin on the sanctuary. For the first time, one would not need to climb a hill to be present at worship at Gracehill. It is quite likely that the older members soon appreciated this when their mobility became an issue.



A little-known remarkable fact is that this green, stone-cut, limestone building was built in six months. This is not blocks and mortar. Each stone had to be cut and fitted to match the stones next to it. The skill, craftsmanship, and commitment required for such a feat are outstanding. The walls are also thicker than other buildings. The commitment to this work remains a gold standard. Bishop Conrad Spencer, a son of Gracehill, remembers the names of some of those skilled craftsmen - Bros George Henry, Randall Williams, Mayers, and Gordon. It is good that their names live on. It remains unclear if their labour was hired or volunteered.



Not to be outdone in their commitment to the building of the sanctuary were the women of Gracehill. Stories abound of the stones that were carried on heads to the site from Old Gracehill. For the pace at which the worked progressed, these women must have made several trips per day. In addition to hauling limestone to the site, some also broke stones. They were fully committed to getting the work done. This hard labour required healthy eating and the women showed up in that department as well. They cooked so that everyone could eat. Women were invaluable to this project.

On July 19, 1964, the sanctuary was dedicated to the glory of God by Bishop Peter M. Gubi. Some consider this a record with construction taking only six months. It is a testament to their commitment and purpose.





At this fiftieth anniversary of the building of the current sanctuary, Gracehill is engaged in another audacious project. Even after treatment, termites continue to attack the wooden pews. We have begun the process of purchasing 300 metal chairs for the sanctuary. Each chair cost about US\$75 or about EC\$205. Installation of the new pews is expected by December 2024 when a special thanksgiving event will be held to celebrate the 50th anniversary. BE KIND RATHER THAN BE NICE

In the context of striving to be kind rather than just nice, it is important to recognise that true kindness goes beyond mere surface-level politeness or seeking approval from others. The Bible teaches us that our focus should be on reflecting God's love and character in all that we do, rather than simply trying to be liked by everyone.

The apostle Paul, in his letter to the Galatians, emphasises the importance of living out our faith with sincerity and authenticity, rather than seeking the approval of others:

"Am I now trying to win the approval of human beings, or of God? Or am I trying to please people? If I were still trying to please people, I would not be a servant of Christ." - Galatians 1:10 (NIV)

This verse reminds us that as followers of Christ, our primary goal should be to please God rather than seeking the approval or acceptance of others. approved by others.

Kindness rooted in a genuine desire to reflect God's love is far more meaningful and impactful than simply trying to be nice to gain popularity or favour with others.

Ultimately, our calling as Christians is to imitate Christ in all aspects of our lives, showing kindness, love, and compassion to those around us without seeking self-gratification or recognition:

"Be imitators of God, therefore, as dearly loved children and live a life of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God." - Ephesians 5:1-2 (NIV)

By choosing to be kind in alignment with God's will, we demonstrate a deeper commitment to our faith and a genuine desire to reflect the love of Christ to the world, rather than simply striving to be liked or approved by others.

The Bible is filled with verses that emphasise the importance of

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law." - Galatians 5:22-23 (NIV)

This passage highlights how kindness is a fruit of the Holy Spirit, reflecting the character of God in our interactions with others. Choosing to be kind, even when it is challenging, is a powerful way to demonstrate our faith and embody the love of Christ in our daily lives.

In addition, the book of Ephesians encourages us to be imitators of God and walk in love and kindness:

"Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you." - Ephesians 4:32 (ESV)






