Vision Statement

A Church - Transformed, United, Victorious in Christ

Reasons to Believe

The Lord is risen! He is risen indeed. This is probably the most popular statement of the Easter season. At Easter we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus after the crucifixion and burial for three days. Easter is therefore about the triumph of life over death through the power of God. The resurrection opens a path for reconciliation between God and humanity because blood was shed for the sins of the world (Hebrews 9:22). Without Jesus's death, there is no possibility of salvation – being saved and inheriting eternal life. The Apostle Paul puts it this way, "And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith... And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins" (1 Cor. 15:14 & 17). Everything hangs and rides on the validity and reality of the resurrection.

Some may ask, can we really believe that Jesus died for a few days then came back to life? How can know this is true? Those are good questions. It has been said that most Christians are two to three questions away from denying the faith. For too long, we have simply accepted the doctrines of the faith without requiring more explanation. To require explanation is not doubting the faith. In fact, asking for an explanation is referred to as faith seeking understanding. Let us be clear that faith and reason are not opposed to each other. They are inextricably bound because they originate from the same place – God our Creator and Sustainer. Christ-followers need to know thy "why" behind their faith.

This is where the ministry of Christian Education is vital. Christian Education as a discipline is the intentional and unintentional teaching of the Christian faith so that the hearer may come to believe fully in Jesus Christ and be equipped for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up, until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ. (Ephesians 4: 12-13). Christian Education is about growing faith or faith formation as it is currently known. Christian Education is vital to the ministry of the church. One possible reason for the lack of growth among many believers might be found in a reduced emphasis on the Christian Education ministry in many churches. Where the formation is weak and lacking substantial input, the long-term effects will soon be felt.

As we celebrate Easter another time, are you curious about Easter and the validity of the claims that Jesus rose from the dead?

Curiosity is good. It helps us to get behind the veil to the deeper things of our faith. Faith seeking understanding is to be encouraged. Following are some thoughts towards establishing the validity of the resurrection claims after sharing a thought on the origin of the word "Easter."

It is true that Easter is not original to Christianity. There was a pagan festival called Easter that was held around Spring. It was at one of the early Church Councils (Nicaea) that the decision was taken to adopt that Festival for Christianity with a focus on the resurrection of Jesus. This might have been a strategy to draw people but there was no loss of the meaning of the resurrection.. The resurrection of Jesus is limited to Jesus only so far. When Lazarus came back to life (John 11: 38-44), that was a resuscitation. That was also the case with the widow of Nain's son (Luke 7: 11-17). Life returned to the bodied and their physical state remained the same.

Internal validity- Biblical evidence

When Jesus got up that first resurrection morning, the mortal had put on immortality. Jesus had a glorified body. What does mean? Well...it means that Jesus's body was now doing things that it had not previously done. Recall that Jesus appeared to the disciples who were locked away for fear of the Jews. The doors were locked but that did not stop him from entering (John 20: 19, Luke 24:36). Resurrection means that material changes had taken place as with Jesus and that is the promise for each believer (I Cor. 15: 50-55). The change in Jesus's body proves that he was resurrected. It was not a ghost or a fantasy. It was a real body, fully alive that even needed food for sustenance (Luke 24:41b).

Even the disciples were afraid because they had never seen Jesus enter a locked room before.

Jesus was alive and with them as he had been in previous times. Jesus was caring enough to appear to boost the faith of Thomas who found it hard to believe, even though his friend told him.

These appearances with the disciples proved that his was a physical, actual resurrection.

The Bible also records that Jesus appeared to other people. The writer of 1 Corinthians 15: 6 notes that Jesus appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers and sisters at the same time. Jesus was not reserving his appearances. He wanted people to know that he was alive and that the things he spoke about before the crucifixion, were trustworthy.

Beyond this, the actions of the disciples after Jesus's ascension are a powerful indication that the resurrection is credible. No matter how convinced the disciples were that Jesus was resurrected, if they did not have the evidence of Jesus's resurrection, they would not have given their lives to the process. Furthermore, if they wanted to be delusional, all the Roman authorities needed to do was to produce the dead body of Jesus. Remember the church started at Pentecost which was only fifty days after the resurrection. Producing the body would have blown up their story. Further, it suited Rome's purposes to quash this new movement.

However, they could not produce the body and there were enough people alive who had seen Jesus after his crucifixion. The Roman authorities persecuted the church as it was subversive to the Roman emperor who was seen as god. Even though the disciples were persecuted and some of the worse ways, they held to their faith because they had seen the risen Christ.

External validity - non-biblical claims

What if someone says they do not believe in the validity of the Bible. As problematic as that might be from a faith perspective, we can still establish that Jesus's resurrection was not a fabrication. There is external evidence that records events in the life of Jesus. Josephus, a Jewish, military historian was one such recorder. He mentions Jesus and his disciples. He talks about Jesus's crucifixion and the reports that the disciples kept to his teaching after his death. While he does not declare faith in Jesus, he notes that Jesus was real and was crucified.

If there was evidence that the stories of Jesus were found to be untrue, it is likely that he would have included that information.

Roman governor and historian Tacitus also made reference to Jesus's crucifixion. He confirms in his reference that Jesus was a real figure, that Christianity had spread across Rome, and that the authorities were concerned because Christian practices undermined the rule of the emperor. There are other external sources that corroborate that the story of the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus are historical facts. If they are historical facts, then they are worth our attention.

Personal encounter

Christianity is a religion of faith. People do not become Christ-followers because of intellectual ascent. We follow Christ because of a personal encounter with God, through Jesus by the power of the Holy Spirit. Ultimately, you will believe in the resurrection because you met Jesus for yourself. The person with an experience is not at the mercy of a person with a theory. Christian Education provides supporting information – theories that point in the way of truth. But it is the Holy Spirit who does the work of changing hearts and lives.

Conclusion

We can believe in the resurrection because the people who lived it shared the events with us in the Bible. We can believe because there is evidence outside the Bible that support the faith claim of the Bible. We can believe in the resurrection of Jesus because, like Paul on the road to Damascus, we met Jesus for ourselves.


PEC Meeting
